

Worthless or Priceless?

"That which is worthless, sinful man, was paid for by that which is priceless, the Son of God." — Allan Wolfson

Think about it. We—you and I—because of Eve (ok! Adam too) were condemned. Because of that condemnation of sin, man is separated from the source of life and all that is good.

It kind of reminds me of when I bought our new car. We paid X amount of dollars for it. But the minute we separated that car, drove off from that dealership, the car became "used," depreciated, and devalued by several thousand dollars.

Genesis 2:7 says that man was formed from the dust of the earth. I do not know how many ounces of dust of this earth man was made from, but I do know that a 40 lb. bag of earth goes for \$1.14 a bag at Lowe's. That works out to be about 2 1/2¢ per pound. My point is we are not worth much as far as dust/dirt goes. But what of the eyes and heart of God? He looks at us differently.

Isaiah 43:4 says "Since you were precious in my sight, you have been honored and I have loved you...." We have been created by God. We have been reformed by God. The price for that redemption is and was very costly—the life of God Himself. You did not come in a K-Mart special. You were paid top dollar for.

Let me give you an illustration. #1, remember no analogy is perfect. #2, no illustration can truly explain God's ultimate love for mankind.

Here it comes: I love ants. I have thousands of ants and hundreds of ant farms. Ok. Good. But I have a mean neighbor who at one time was a good friend. He was like family. One day he decided that he wanted to kill all my ants that I loved—every one of them.

This is where the illustration is hard to understand, because it doesn't seem to make any sense. I decide I love my ants and I don't want them to die. I cannot bear the thought of them being destroyed. So I offer myself to him to die for them. My life for the life of the ants I so love.

God said, "I can't let them go." I will go. I will die. I will die for you, Allan Wolfson, the death you deserve. I will die for you, my children at Toledo First. I am willing to die for the whole world. John 3:16.

Can The Best Pastors Be Women?



Pastor Rebekah Liu is a seminary student pursuing a Ph.D. in New Testament Studies specializing in the Book of Revelation at Andrews University. She was raised in a staunchly communist family and community but was converted at 17, baptized at 18, and at 19 began preaching and doing other pastoral ministry in house churches.

Since becoming Christians, she and her mother and brother have raised up 400 home churches that now has 10k members led by four pastors three of whom are women. She currently pastors the Chinese congregation at Andrews University and will be speaking in Dayton, Ohio, on October 22 during Acts 2011 — a convocation of Ohio Adventists celebrating the 100 year anniversary of the book Acts of the Apostles.

I'm looking forward to attending this gathering and I'm hoping with enough notice, some of you will join me and come hear her story with me. She is living proof that women can become the best pastors and prophetic voices in the Adventist Church and our world today just like the prophet Joel predicted (cf. Joel 2:28-29). 
Can Kids Change the World?

It is it possible for a kid, a young person, to do something that could change the world? Before you say yes or no, let's first ask ourselves: what does it mean to change the world? I asked several people what it means to them. I got everything from God being shown to the world, peace, love, to making an impact in the world around you.

For the purpose of this article let's stick with changing the world around us, because that is a easier to define. The world around us is our family, our neighborhood, our church, and even our city, right? We have been going through a series in both YO Sabbath School (youth age) and KidConnect (Kids Church) about how God has made us to make a difference in our world.

In fact the youth have been reading a book given to them called "You Were Made to Make a Difference" by Max Lucado. The kids in KidConnect have been discovering how God can use what's in their hand, like Moses with his staff and David with his sling, to make a dramatic impact in the world around them.

This is so special for our kids and young people to learn at an early age—that God has endowed them with special abilities that can be used for Him and other people. We see examples of young people in God's Word who were not defined by culture or their age, but by the big vision God had for their lives. We see it through world-changers like David who was anointed to be king when he was still a teenager herding sheep. We see it through Jeremiah who was called to be a prophet when he was young and, most of all, we see it



through Jesus who was speaking to his elder Pharisees in the temple when he was just a boy! Jeremiah actually told God "I'm too young," but God told him "Don't say 'I'm too young' for you must go wherever I send you" (Jeremiah 1:7).

I encourage you not to set mediocre expectations for youth because they're young, but as a church body to set high expectations for our kids. Paul instructed Timothy who lead a church when he was young, to "let no one despise your youth, but set an example for the believers in faith, love, and purity." (1 Timothy 4:12) There is no limit to what God can do with children. He can use them, even to change the world, because "nothing is impossible with God." —Pastor Daniel ##
